## Pastor's Report

The Rev. Renie Stamm-Kirk

Dear Beloved Ones,

Every time I read any of the Gospels stories about Jesus asking the Disciples to drop their nets and "Come follow me" I immediately think of their families... I didn't always think this way, when I heard them as a kid I thought, oh cool he picked them. As an adult who felt called for as long as I could remember, I also cringed at these stories, wondered how many he asked before he got to the ones who said yes. Sure I'll follow you...you see I said no for a very long time. Oh I tried to follow him while doing what I love, but like the good book says "No one can serve two masters. Either you will hate the one and love the other, or you will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve both God and money." (Matthew 6:24) And so as I



tried to serve God while working in Corporate America and chasing after a very lucrative career, I really put God in the background while money was what I really worshiped. After our daughter Katie was born, my priorities shifted and suddenly I wanted, needed a different focus. Following Jesus is not easy, our church knows this, and there's not just one path. One does not have to "drop their nets" so to speak and follow. Or leave their careers.

Following Jesus can and does look like sharing your musical talents with church on Sunday morning or different nights of the week, to practice in the hand bell choir or the Sanctuary Choir. Following Jesus can and does mean making 75 bag lunches full of much needed items and peanut butter and jelly sandwiches for day laborers and homeless folks. Or sharing your resources and your time to make and serve breakfast with 100's of folks who come hungry for food and kindness on Second Saturdays. Following Jesus can and does mean bringing meals to the homebound, or those recovering from surgery, or providing rides for folks to the doctor, or sending care cards, or caring for the building and the grounds so the church that's been here for 150 years can be here for a 150 more. Or the countless other small and big things the wonderful folks at CCCUCC do here or in the world. He didn't say "follow me and I'll teach you to engage in deep theological debates," or "drop your nets and come to a marathon meeting of a church council." He said "follow me and I will teach you to catch people; I will teach you to use your gifts and skills and experience to gather followers to be the church in the world." And in doing so, you'll find a deeper meaning in your life than you have ever imagined. St. Augustine once remarked that fisherman Peter didn't really lay aside his nets, but just exchanged them. Jesus took the everyday skills of these disciples and gave them new direction. They didn't so much abandon their nets as replace them with tools fit for their new call - they now were fishing for people. This is the way the call of God usually comes - while we're doing the daily tasks that fall to us.



This past year beside the many ministries we engaged in, we also had a great 12 Step Study around our own racism, designed by Ron Buford. The Racist Anonymous program is based on the Twelve Steps (adapted from Alcoholics Anonymous), which we try, little by little, one day at a time, to apply to our lives along with daily prayer or meditation. By engaging this program along with the loving interchange of help among members makes us ready to receive serenity.

That's the year we've had, a year of fellowship, a year of study, a year of knowing ourselves better, a year of listening to the still speaking God.

# **Music Ministry**

One of the most notable things to celebrate in the life of our congregation this past year is the ten-year anniversary of our pastor, Rev. Renie. A decade-long ministry in a local church exceeds the norm these days, and Rev. Renie's dynamic, purposeful vision has caused us to be more intentional about feet-on-the ground ministry. I am grateful for her leadership and the sense of continuity it has provided: enabling and supporting our second-Saturday sharing of food with people in need, supporting our commitment to a major building and grounds project, and providing behind-the-scenes pastoral care for all of us when it is needed. I am grateful as well for her support of music ministry at CCC and for her recognition of the combined efforts of all those who

contribute to it.

Here is a summation of what that music ministry entails:

The Sanctuary Choir sings in worship a majority of Sundays September through June, offering a variety of genres. We have a steady corps of volunteer joined by singers who cannot make such a major commitment but who love to sing on special days, particularly on Christmas and Easter, and who can stay after church on Sundays to rehearse. The Women and Girls' Chorus sings several times during the year, drawing from the women in the Sanctuary Choir and from some of our youth and children. A Children's Choir sings in the Christmas concert and also on Christmas Eve. Thank you to the parents and other adults who provide transportation and can stay after church on Sunday so the children/youth can rehearse. In addition to these groups, various people also sing occasional solos and duets. I want to mention one particular duet—sung by Audrey Benton and Leslie Blackie—that raised an ovation from the audience at the Christmas concert. Audrey sang again in April, guided by Leslie, and we witnessed for ourselves the progress Audrey has made in recovering from the event that nearly claimed her life.

In addition to our vocalists, instrumentalists also provide their unique sounds for our worship services. The Rolling Tones Handbell Choir (see Director Leslie Lessenger's report) makes the room ring with beautiful music regularly throughout the year. The piano and at times the organ support the singing of the congregation—the most important choir of all. Add to these the other instruments used in worship this year: clarinet, flute, violin, trumpet, guitar, bass, mandolin, ukulele, and banjo. Drum, finger cymbals, and chimes also appear at times. A guest cellist and a guest flutist joined us for Christ the King Sunday. (Just waiting in the wings is a harp—really!) Instrumentalists welcome churchgoers with music from various combinations of instruments before every service. They are also to be found playing on second Saturday in Vallejo—even the handbell ringers! Instrumentalists also play occasional solos, duets, and trios for the ministry of music during worship as well as for CCC's annual Christmas concert.

For many of our musicians, the music-making doesn't stop at the church door. Quite a number of them are to be found performing in the community beyond the walls of the church, adding their voices or instruments to other musical groups: Nancy Gilman in Cantare Con Vivo, Cholé McGraw in the Melody Choral Singers, Laura Pyles in the Vallejo Choral Society, Leslie Blackie in the Pleasanton Broadway Chorus, Deborah Shanks in the quarterly concerts of El Sobrante's Hope Lutheran Church, and the Hippie Chicks (Liz Cleves and Marilyn Scrutchins) on second Saturdays and elsewhere. Dean Gilman plays in several different bands, among them the Vallejo Just for Fun Band, which provides free musical entertainment for seniors. Dean, Shelby Riddle, and Barbara Hamm comprise Jazz Gorilla, which plays regularly for the Vallejo Thanksgiving feast for low-income seniors, the Longest Night Christmas Service at St. Paul's Episcopal Church (which CCC helps to sponsor), the Vallejo DOC Christmas Bazaar, various UCC events, and occasional fundraisers. Shelby Riddle also plays with the San Francisco Scottish Fiddlers, going on their spring tour, and she and Dale Olm and Barbara play with the Pleasant Hill Taizé Group. Though these groups are not

part of our church's music program, these musicians carry the joy of music-making into the wider community and often, not incidentally, their association with CCC in the process.

Music both heals and enriches, and I am so grateful to all these musicians for using their gifts in the service of God and this church—and for the countless hours of practice that enables them to do so. They make the music happen: the more people who are up front doing music, the happier I am (though it's definitely an algorithmic challenge the last several weeks before Christmas and Easter trying to find times when everyone can rehearse!). I am especially grateful to Deborah Shanks, who has created numerous extra instrumental parts for some of the Sanctuary Choir anthems, for the Rolling Tones, and for Christmas concert pieces. She also did special Christmas carol arrangements specifically geared to our particular instrumentation for the carol sing-along at the Christmas concert and again for the gathering music in worship, a labor of love which required double-digit hours. She also very ably carried on the music program while I was out for surgery in October. Once again, Deborah, thank you!

An important adjunct to my music ministry at CCC is my continued writing and occasional publishing of new hymns. I was thrilled recently to learn that the Hymn Society had chosen all three of the hymns I had submitted for its special collection of hymns: Singing Welcome: Hymns and Songs of Hospitality to Refugees and Immigrants. An even greater thrill was receiving a text message from Rev. Renie at the homiletics (preaching) conference she attended in Texas, with a video of the entire group singing my piece, "Come to the Table of Grace." I cannot adequately describe how this affected me; I write to give fresh voice to the gathered community of believers wherever they gather, and this was like Christmas and Easter all rolled into one! Far less important, but still a source of learning and pleasure, is playing occasionally at Max's Opera Café in San Francisco, and, the last couple of years, at the Bourbon Orleans Hotel in the French Quarter of New Orleans (ask me if you want to know how that happened!).

# **Building and Grounds**

Jim Lessenger

- 1. Stone Family Trust: Account is attached.
- 2. Parking lot lights: After severe winds, several needed repairs.
- 3. Signage:
  - a. All signage is up.
  - b. The PTL sign disintegrated during a severe storm and will need replacement once the wall is repainted.
  - c. The "tombstone" sign in front of the church was rebuilt, wired for LED, and painted.

#### 4. Landscaping:

- a. Irrigation: In progress.
- b. Planting: The top two levels were planted. The entry level was planted.
- c. Pre-emergent spray: Roundup applied to all cracks and borders in May.
- d. Weeding and pruning is a constant task.
- e. PG&E trimmed the Century plants because they were too close to the poles.
- f. Due to flooding in the back (street end) of the CE building, we placed a French drain underground from the edge of the building to the upper driveway. This was done with labor from Genesis House. There was no more flooding in subsequent storms.
- g. Weed cloth and wood chips were placed on the slopes between parking level 1 and 2, and level 2 and 3.
- h. A substantial number of dead plants and trees were removed from the top slope. It looks a lot better.
- i. A wood picnic table was purchased and installed on the patio.

#### 5. CE building:

- a. Screens were rebuilt.
- b. New fans were purchased and installed.
- 6. Sanctuary: Improvement plan is in progress.
  - a. The refinish all the wood doors is in progress.
  - b. Committee recommendation on pews and chairs was forwarded to the Council and Congregation.
- 7. Alarm: Replaced.
- 8. Trees: One tree fell on the sandbox just minutes after the kids left. We ended up removing three trees on an emergency basis and another on a routine basis. The remainder were trimmed. One tree that the tree trimmers cut down fell on a power line, causing a fire in the weeds and plants of the front lot. The fire department and PG&E took care of it. But, the insurance company for the tree trimmers had to pay the electric company a hefty amount of money. In addition, we had to clean up the area.
- 9. Electrical:
  - a. This year the electrical system in the sanctuary, fellowship hall and office was improved.
  - b. The electrical system in the CE building was expanded and brought up to code.
  - c. We replaced all the bulbs on the campus with LED lights (except for the rim lights on the sanctuary building which are fluorescent).

#### 10. Painting:

- a. The two main buildings, the shed, and the gazebo were power washed, primed and painted this year.
- b. The front of the sanctuary was changed with the removal of the cross and the exposure of the beams.
- 11. Personnel: I am resigning as the B and G chair effective the end of December. This gives a new person lots of time to work with me and get up to steam.
